Mission & Outreach Committee

Offerings of letters provide a mechanism for Christian church members to work together to promote God's kingdom on Earth.

The idea of offerings of letters originated with Bread for the World. Bower Hill has conducted many over the past decade on behalf of themes suggested by Bread for the World other themes. The procedure has been to set up writing tables with information and supplies during the refreshment period and ask members to write one or more letters and leave them for mailing by the church. Members were also asked to take the information and write letters from home.

The Mission & Outreach Committee has decided to try an alternate procedure, which might be more effective. Information will be provided to the whole congregation, and members will be asked to write letters at home and bring them to church for collection on a given Sunday. They will then be mailed together by the Church office.



We hope that this procedure will result in a greater participation by our members.

Global Village Update, by Jean Miewald

Habitat for Humanity Global Village currently has trips planned and available to the following countries: Ghana, Madagascar, South Africa, Zambia, Mongolia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Armenia, Bulgaria, Hungary, Kyrgyzstan, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Russia, Brazil, Ecuador, Guatemala, Mexico, Paraguay, and Florida. A 'repeat' trip to Cluj, Romania in early September, led by the same team as the trip I took is also being planned. These trips usually cost around \$1400 plus airfare, but remember that the Margaret McKee Scholarship fund may pay for up to 75% of your costs. DOING GOD'S WORK-CARRYING OUT OUR MISSION —by Dave Hicks

On the evening of December 15th, the caring, compassionate touch of Bower Hill Community Church and it's members was felt by the flood victims of Oakdale, Pa. Thanks to the hard work of many church members, we were able to do a great deal to boost the spirits and provide some much needed financial assistance to many families victimized by the September floods. Due to Chan Ketchum's persistence (Chan persistent?) and concern, we helped the Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church hold a dinner for the flood victims in Oakdale at the church. First, you need to understand that the Good Shepherd Church was itself, badly damaged in the flood, having had 10 feet of water in the building. Imagine our church with the offices totally filled with water and 4 more feet in the sanctuary! Initially, seeing the damage was disheartening. But seeing the members of Good Shepherd, joined by about 10 of our own members, provide a fantastic dinner for the flood victims; that was very uplifting and made us all feel very good about what we were doing.

It started with your Mission committee voting to dedicate \$1,000 to the effort, then SHIM sent another \$500. Leonard sent his letter to our congregation concerning the effort and you all responded generously with a total of \$2,715 in cash and gift cards from Giant Eagle, Home Depot and Wal-Mart. Six hams were purchased and cooked with sweet potatoes by members of the church and another seven or eight members met at the church in Oakdale to help serve the meal. All in all, approximately 80 people were served and \$4,215 in gift cards was distributed to families in need.

Thanks to all who contributed money, gift cards or food, or helped prepare and serve the food. God bless you for helping to make a difference.

A Necessary Change

Recently, just under \$25,000 was spent on repairing the lighting in the sanctuary. This money came from the buildings and grounds portion of the Half Century Campaign. The repair of the lights was not anticipated when the campaign began, but it was necessary. The lighting in the sanctuary is complicated—originally there were 256 fluorescent lights and some incandescent lights as well. It is a three part system: the lights, a controller in the attic and switches in the sanctuary. The controller and switches were failing and could not be repaired. I am sure that all of us would have preferred to have spent this \$25,000 on, for example, new windows; but the lighting was more important.
