Each day is a new beginning for us, no matter our age. And each one is full of opportunities to respond to God's grace and love. Let us boldly go forward with joy and celebrate God's grace as we remember that Easter is never really over as God continues to offer us new life and new beginnings.

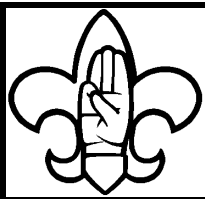

Bower Hill Community Church Joins the Presbyterian Coffee Project



At the March 7 Session meeting, Bower Hill elders voted to participate in the Presbyterian Coffee Project. All coffee served at Bower Hill will be fairly traded coffee purchased through the Presbyterian Coffee Project. This program is part of PCUSA's Enough for Everyone program and an interdenominational program called Equal Exchange. In essence, the Presbyterian Coffee Project is part of the Fair Trade movement that guarantees the farmers who actually grow the coffee we drink a fair price and a market for the fruits of their labor. By participating in the Presbyterian Coffee project we are involved in a different type of mission. We are directly supporting farmers in Latin America, Asia, and Africa in their efforts to provide their families food, shelter, an education, and a bright future.

The traditional path a coffee bean takes from the farm to our coffee makers involves what the farmers call "coyotes" who offer the lowest price possible to the farmers and then take their "cut" and then pass it on to intermediaries who take another cut, etc. Equal Exchange buys directly from the farmers and cooperatives; roasting, packaging, and marketing the coffee (and other products!) directly through the cooperation of church groups such as PCUSA. This allows farmers to receive a fair price for their coffee and removes the uncertainty to which they were subjected before. For many farmers, Fair Trade is the difference between growing coffee and cocaine.

What effect are the Presbyterian Coffee Project and Equal Exchange having? Listen to José Luis Castillo Vásquez, a farmer from Las Colinas Coop, El Salvador: "Thanks to God and Equal Exchange, we will not die of hunger, we will not lose our land and our children are able to attend school. I want to thank all of the people that purchase our coffee. It is thanks to you that we have a seed of hope in our lives."

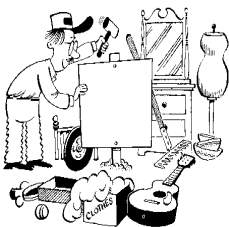
Youth News briefs

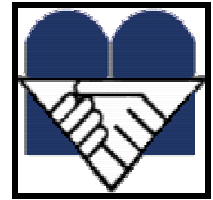
Flea Market '05

SHIM News



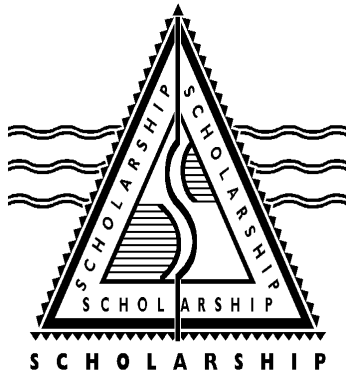
Eve Johnson is the new SHIM Family Assistance Coordinator. She joined the staff in February after Harry Dietz, former Coordinator, announced his retirement in January.

Margaret McKee Scholarship To Be Awarded

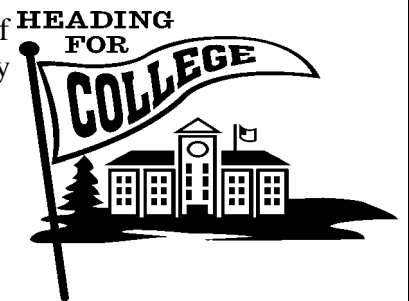

PCUSA Situation Report Update

2004 Hurricanes

March 17, 2005

On a Mission:

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is continuing to resource our presbyteries and churches that were devastated by the unprecedented string of powerful hurricanes in 2004. Keeping with our commitment to accompany disaster survivors throughout the arduous, long-term recovery process, PDA recently sent grants to the Presbytery of Florida and Peace River Presbytery bringing the PDA response to almost \$1.1 million.

About \$575,000 has been provided to meet the needs of disaster survivors in fifteen middle governing bodies from Puerto Rico to Pittsburgh. More than \$510,000 has been granted to help 39 churches and three Presbyterian-related colleges repair damaged property.

Physically manifesting God's love for all creation, 21 members of the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Team (PDAT) have volunteered their time (some for as long as four weeks) in response to the crisis. In providing spiritual care, damage assessment, organizational advice, and volunteer coordination, these dedicated volunteers accomplished every assignment and made it possible for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance to be present throughout the broad, disaster-impacted area.

Even in a major disaster, resources become scarce. As a result, volunteers are often needed to sustain the long-term recovery of disaster survivors and communities. Some of our most heavily damaged presbyteries have established a Disaster Response Task Force and are hosting and coordinating volunteer workteams. Helping others in their greatest hour of need is not only central to the church's mission, but also makes for a great spring break/summer vacation mission project. . Please continue to pray for the hurricane survivors who are struggling to rebuild their livelihoods. Pray also for the thousands of caregivers who have sacrificed self in providing hope and comfort to those who have suffered great loss. And remember that it is the One Great Hour of Sharing offering that makes the ministry of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance possible - please give generously.
