# On A Mission

Ringin in Romania—Margaret Zabo

I wanted to share some information about the mission trip I went on this past summer to Romania with an inter-generational handbell choir. I am scheduled to make a presentation regarding the trip at a future Adult Education session, but recently a seventeen year old member of the choir wrote the following piece for a handbell newsletter. I think she tells the story better than I can. So here's Sarah Mischner's account of the trip.



I never dreamed that teaching children how to play hand chimes as part of a mission trip through the International Children's Aid Foundation could really help them all that much--let alone orphans in a country I formerly only thought of in relation to Bram Stoker's "Dracula"--sure, they might enjoy it, but what kind of aid is it, really? What sort of aid could a seventeen year-old girl offer? Spending less than two weeks in Criscior, Romania, taught me how truly wrong I was.

From the very first time we set up the bells for a church service when we arrived, I could sense the fascination with the music and the instruments. The children all wanted to hold the chimes and make that music for themselves. Our first rehearsal with the kids was in the Baptist Church in Brad, the larger town scant minutes from what we referred to as home, and we started with the Celebrated Canon. I was paired with a girl about my age, Mirela, teaching her the part for her bass chime. I realized how important the music was to these people when she told me that everyone had been waiting excitedly for days, anticipating our arrival.

Their immediate love for us made the whole trip even more of a blessed experience for me. Nearly every spare moment I had was spent with the kids, from tiny Florin and Delia at Casa Emanuel (the orphanage in Criscior, where I stayed on the second floor) to Flavius (a boy a few years younger than me). The youngest loved to be held or played with, and show us how they could count to ten in English, while the older kids took part in global teenage rituals--hanging out and talking and laughing, telling us about their lives and asking about ours.

In the days that followed, I spent hours upon hours working with the chime choirs: turning pages, teaching rhythm exercises, helping with technique; even teaching something I learned at the Area II Festival, Maori Sticks. From the smallest to the oldest, they eagerly soaked up the knowledge and the skills to create music. It was so amazing for me to see them so utterly appreciative and thankful for something I didn't even think would be helpful, and so wonderful to see how happy they became when they created music. As they learned their songs and practiced them, some would break into applause in joy at what they could do.

The room where we played bells was situated over a bakery (where we would all traipse to on a quest for a pretzel or a pastry filled with vanilla or chocolate), and across the street from the new Christian Center, under construction (and a little destruction) for the duration of our stay. Sometimes as we sat at lunch, my friends on the construction team would tell me how the music floated out the window and created a constant glorious undertone to their hammering and drilling--the song "Come Christians Join to Sing," or "The Great Gate of Kiev" echoing out over the streets of Brad.

It hit me that, although I might not be working in the hospital clinic, and I wasn't involved in the construction crew, I had a lot to offer. I still do. I think that the choice to go to Romania was one of the best decisions I have ever made; Knowing that my passion for music can help people on the other side of the globe was staggering, and at the same time uplifting. Feeling needed and appreciated by people who knew me for what seems a moment in the whole of a lifetime was so touching--as if God directed us to meet and aid one another. I offered music, they offered their open arms and hearts.

I think the ultimate moments of realization of how great a gift it was to meet and know and help these people came when the man who directs the Romanian arm of ICAF blessed us for coming to Romania, and when someone told me the words of a woman after hearing the children play a final beautiful concert: "This is music sent from heaven."

Sarah Mischner is a high school senior at Princeton Day School. She was a member of the hand bell choir assembled to teach Romanian people to play the hand chimes donated by Area II of the American Guild for English Handbell Ringers. The other ringers included a grandmother and granddaughter, four mother/daughter teams, a husband and wife, a younger single woman and my director. In addition to teaching chimes, the choir played at a church service in Brad, in Hunedoara Castle, in a school in Criscior, and in an open-air band stand in a local park. The group's first concert was impromptu – played on the Romanian-Hungarian border to ease the 9-hour delay caused by the loss of electricity incurred by a major storm. Fellow travelers served as music holders while we played and were as delighted as we by the joy that music brings.

## Surfing the Edge

Over the course of 2006, we as a congregation will have an unprecedented opportunity to shape the future path of our church's place in the community. As some of you may recall an extensive survey was conducted during 2005. This survey asked detailed questions of the congregation, leadership and staff to determine our collective perceptions of the church's role in each of our lives and the community in general. The survey was the initial step in the Surfing the Edge program. This program is based on a belief that each member of the congregation has a responsibility to God and the church to be an active participant in the church's overall mission and that mission is identified through collective discussions across the congregation.



To that end, your session has spent a significant amount of time reviewing the survey and discussing the results. As we move to the next step, we are enlisting your help. 
