
LEARNING TO PRAY BY REV. LAURIE

OCTOBER 2007

In the past few weeks I have been in a number of different situations where the topic of prayer has come up. It is no wonder that prayer is on my mind as I have been thinking about it in the following places: at the session retreat in August which focused on the book, *Becoming a Blessed Church* by N. Graham Standish; at the Session meetings that have followed; at Koinonia as we explore the book *Devotional Classics*, edited by Richard J. Foster; and in my own study of Jane E Vennard's book *a praying congregation*. It is as if God has been hitting me with a two by four and saying talk about this! So, I am.

Perhaps I needed to be hit in the head a few times to spur me on to talk about prayer as it is one of the most emotion laden and intimate things that we do as people of faith. It is hard to talk about prayer because at one time or another we have probably all struggled with a challenging prayer life. For me, prayer has been something that I have constantly had to struggle with. I remember in seminary going to the head of the Spirituality department to ask if I could be part of the Spirituality Concentration with much fear and trembling. I remember confessing in tears how difficult I found it to pray and how much of a failure I felt like as a second year student with an abysmal prayer life. So began a difficult but richer journey into prayer for me. However, the struggle has not ending. Prayer for me is like a roller coaster ride and I have been so blessed by the discussions that have been taking place about prayer and spiritual development in recent days.

One of the best gifts I have gained over these last few weeks came from Jane E. Vennard's book, *a praying congregation*. As she talks about prayer, she encourages the reader to get in touch with how they learned to pray. She writes, "Those early lessons, whether in childhood or later, are the foundation on which your present prayer life rests." (p.23) As we reflect on these lessons or memories, we can gain amazing insights into what we believe about prayer (sometimes without realizing it). Perhaps we were taught that God is anxious to hear all our prayers or that only certain prayers are ok. Perhaps we were taught that there is a certain way we have to pray or we were given the gift of freedom to pray as we felt led. Perhaps we observed someone praying with joy or pain or fear or anger and that example informs our prayer life. As I was considering my own experiences and memories of being taught to pray, I realized that somewhere I picked up the fear of boring God or frustrating God with my simple and selfish prayers. The thought just tumbled out without my realizing it. Did I really think that? I realized that yes, I usually do filter my prayers, without even realizing it. My prayers were often held back because I reasoned that there are so many big things that God has to worry about, why should I bother God with my fears or concerns. You can't imagine how freeing it was to let down the filter with the reminder that God wants to hear all our prayers. God loves us so much that God wants to know about all that we care and worry about, all that we celebrate and fear. As a parent, I don't just want my kids to talk to me about what is "important" I want to know everything. Hopes, fears, dreams, desires, needs, everything! So, maybe you already know that God wants to hear it all...but I challenge us all in the days ahead to think of a few prayer experiences and wonder about what lessons you might have picked up along your spiritual journey. I hope that your discovery might be as enlightening as mine and that your prayer life may be enhanced by your reflections.

MINUTE FOR MAKING A DIFFERENCE BY JEAN MIEWALD

Two months ago Alan told us about a way to provide microlending to third world entrepreneurs with a WEB based program called KIVA. Today I am going to talk about another way you can invest...a program that Bill and I participate in called OIKOCREDIT.



Minute for Making a Difference

Founded by a large group of churches in 1975, Oikocredit is an international organization whose mission is to promote social and economic justice by providing opportunities for churches, religious organizations and individuals to make some of their investment dollars available for empowering economically disadvantaged people with credit. Oikocredit makes low-interest loans to more than 400 cooperatives and microcredit institutions in over 65 countries. Oikocredit does not ask for donations. They ask us to invest our money with them. The minimum investment is \$1000 and the investor specifies the interest rate, up to 2% and the term length... from 1 to 5 years.

Many people believe that poor people will not repay their loans. In the last 28 years, Oikocredit has never failed to return to investors their full principal plus interest. Poor communities, cooperatives, and microcredit organizations prefer credit to grants because credit provides people with more decision-making power, more independence, more responsibility and more dignity.

If you are interested in learning more about microlending and Oikocredit, please plan to attend adult ed on the first two Sundays in October. You can also talk to Bill or me for more information.

“Draw us in the Spirit’s tether; for when humbly in Thy name,
Two or three are met together; Thou art in the midst of them.”

(Draw us in the Spirit’s tether, Harold W. Friedell)

These words are taken from the anthem we are singing on October 7, World Communion Sunday. The words are also found in scripture: Matthew 18:20 says, “For where two or three are gathered in My Name, I am there among them.” I have always taken these words to heart, and remember them often during Sunday morning worship, when I’m having a meaningful discussion with a good friend, and most of all, during choir and handbell rehearsals.



In his book Rehearsing the Soul, Terry York describes “family” as an environment in which we learn to handle joys and jealousies, sorrows and celebrations, hugs and hassles. We use the term family in such a broad sense, not just to describe those who are related to us, but in terms of groups who have common interests, commitment, geography, etc. In our own worship service on September 9, many people stated that Bower Hill Community Church is a huge family of believers, and I have come to believe that myself.

“Where two or three are gathered in My Name, I am there among them.” That certainly covers duets, quartets, and surely the three musical ensembles we have in this place. Being aware of Jesus’ presence has an effect on families that are centered on Him. Christ’s presence forces us to remember His teachings and life example. Seeing ourselves and one another through Jesus’ eyes will cause us to be closer and more loving. That helps the music we produce. It is as if the Holy Spirit hums along, adding a spiritual pedal point to our harmony. The Holy Spirit can take our one song and customize the hearing of it for the application needed in each heart in the church family. Look around at those in the Chancel Choir, the Handbell Choir, and the King’s Kids Clappers. They are family. Jesus died for each of them and promised to sit in with the group. We need to enjoy the fellowship. We need to be in awe of God’s grace. We need to be aware of Jesus’ presence, and thank God for the family.


