Dear Friends,

In his poem titled *Star Silver*, Carl Sandburg speaks of

*Star silver playing cross-lights on pine green  
Back in a barn in a Bethlehem slum;  
Why does the story never wear out?*

Sandburg’s poetic message is direct: it is in the Bethlehem stable where heaven and earth meet, where star silver and pine green intertwine; and it is in the Bethlehem Babe, in the presence of the Child Jesus, that the divine and the human merge. An old story, ever new! Why does the story never wear out?

The story never wears out simply because it speaks an eternal truth: Emmanuel . . . God with us. “The Word became flesh and dwelt among us,” wrote the author of John’s Gospel. “We have beheld His glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father.” God took His Word, wrapped it in swaddling clothes, and laid it in a manger, so that love might be more than a Word only heard.



I believe, beyond the shadow of a doubt, that God **WOULD** have been more real to Israel if the Prophets had had a Word in Flesh to point to **RATHER** than just a word that was heard, but no one could possibly **FEEL** or touch or hold; consequently, God took His Word and wrapped Him in swaddling clothes and laid Him in a manger where **LOVE** could be felt and fully known, not just talked about, all of which makes more sense **THAN** lofty ideas, concepts and notions lost in a maze of God-words, God-plans, and God-**TALK** which pale for lack of flesh and blood; Christmas is the centerfold between the Old Testament and the New: in one, people talk **ABOUT** God’s love while in the other, people feel **IT**. I’m glad we live on this side of the centerfold.

The story never wears out because it addresses a perennial need for love and peace. “The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light” (Isaiah). Christmas seems to come at the climax of calamity, even now. This year Christmas—Emmanuel, God with us—comes when a once-prosperous economy is far less prosperous, and we join the rest of the world who are in desperate need of love, peace, harmony, and hope. This same need once again sets the stage for star silver playing cross-lights on pine green, for heaven touching earth, for the divine residing with the human, for love being made real, for Emmanuel, God with us. It’s an old story, ever new, ever relevant—a story that never wears out.

In this joyous season and throughout the new year, may God bless you and those whom you love with the special awareness of Christ’s eternal Presence.

## 2008 CHRISTMAS ANGEL TREES - MISSION OPPORTUNITY

This Christmas we will continue our long-standing tradition of the angel trees. They will again be located in the hall outside of the Friendship room. There will be three trees again this year.



One tree will be for **Hekima Place**, the girls' orphanage in Kenya that we have supported for several years. Approximately 40 young women, who have lost their parents to HIV/AIDS, live at the orphanage and your donation of \$30 will provide education and a safe, loving environment for one of the girls for one month. Please remove an ornament from the tree and make a check payable to Bower Hill Church for \$30, indicate "Hekima Place" in the memo and get it to the church office as soon as you can. Be sure to hang the ornament on your tree at home and every time you look at it, remember the difference you are making.

The second tree will be for **Lydia's Place**, the Pittsburgh organization that provides assistance to incarcerated women and their children as they work to rebuild their lives. Simply take one or more of the angels off the tree, purchase the item indicated on the



angel and return it to the church office unwrapped by Sunday, Dec. 14th. Your gifts will be given to the children at Lydia's annual Holiday party. Hang the angel on your tree at home and know that you are helping a child in need.

The third tree will again support our **Troops in Iraq**, with a slight twist. This Christmas, rather than sending over various small items such as videos, toiletries, etc., your mission committee has decided to adopt a Marine unit. There are about 17 marines in this unit and they need things such as Gerber multi-tools and Camelbak hydration systems, items that would be very difficult for us to purchase. So this year we have decided to ask the members of the congregation to take a star off the tree and write a check for \$20, payable to BHCC, with "OTA" in the memo section. Then, and this is just as important as the money, please write a brief note or thank you card to the unit with your message to the troops. The church treasurer will send a check for the amount collected, along with our notes, to Operation Troop Appreciation ([www.OperationTroopAppreciation.org](http://www.OperationTroopAppreciation.org)), a local group that we have worked with for a couple of years to facilitate support of our troops. They will purchase the needed items and mail them, with our notes, to our troop. Hang the red, white or blue star on your tree and let's hope that they'll all come home safely.



## PITTSBURGH PROJECT REPORT



What do you get if you cross over 150 pairs of hands, a thought-provoking speaker, and the organizational skills and hospitality of The Pittsburgh Project? You get 22 homeowners in the city of Pittsburgh whose dwellings were improved the weekend of November 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup>. Betsy and Alan Hohlfelder, LuAnn McNickle, Bud Hooper, and Jean Miewald joined over 150 other people from as far away as Ann Arbor, Michigan and Silver Spring, Maryland and ranging in age from 11 to 75 to think about what it means to be a follower of Jesus. Bart Campolo used 1 John 4 to remind us that God is Love and rather than trying to "fix" people, we need to just love them, make them part of our community (which will take sacrifice on our part) and tell them that they are loved. The Bower Hill crew's main job for the weekend was replacing drywall and painting the kitchen ceiling for a homeowner on the North Side. This was enhanced by the new drywall being ½ inch thick while the rest of the ceiling was 5/8 inch thick. Some of the other 21 crews worked on exterior painting, yard clean up, or roofing. We slept on bunkbeds with mattresses and there were showers right down the hall. Meals were cooked and served by the Pittsburgh Project staff and while not gourmet, tasted mighty good after a day's work. There was one thing wrong with the weekend, though. You weren't there with us. Our homeowner appreciated our help and in fact had many other jobs lined up for us that we were not able to finish. Perhaps we can do that with you during a service retreat next spring.

During the Advent season, we will again endeavor to keep our hearts and minds focused on the needs of others. The Mission Committee is making plans to continue our efforts to help the homeless at the Washington City Mission over the holidays. Plans are underway, and volunteers can see Rev. Laurie for more information.






