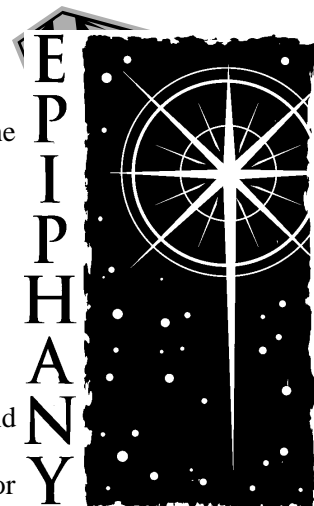
EPIPHANY FEAST

FLEA MARKET UPDATE



Thank you to all the people who made this year's flea market a success-the members who donated items and all the volunteers who worked so hard pricing, setting up and helping out the day of the sale. Thanks to the generosity of the members of Bower Hill the Flea Market made a little over \$2000.

The snack bar manned by the Middies was also a success making a little less than \$200. It started slowly in the morning, but in the afternoon workers and customers alike enjoyed the café-like setting in the hallway in front of the kitchen while enjoying soup and salad provided by the Olive Garden and other assorted treats.

The proceeds from this year's Flea Market will be split into thirds-1/3 to the youth, 1/3 to building and grounds, and 1/3 to mission.

Despite the success of the sale, there were still many items left. We received a call from the Red Cross the Monday after the sale inquiring if there was anything left that we could donate to a family they had just placed in a new unfurnished apartment after a fire in their home. They came by and took a bunch of kitchen items for the displaced family. SHIM also stopped by and took most of the furniture as well as some kitchen stuff. The rest was delivered to Goodwill.

As in years past, Flea Market 2008 was a winner. I'm looking forward to Flea Market 2009.

GREETERS AT BOWER HILL COMMUNITY CHURCH

Greeters are very important for members and visitors at Bower Hill Community Church. For those of you who will be greeting in the coming months, your name tags are in the alphabetized envelopes on the counter in the church office. You will note that just one greeter will be at either the Portico, the Narthex or the Handicapped entrances. Please sign in on the sheet near the nametags and indicate with an "X" where you will be greeting. Greeters are not assigned to locations, but will choose their sites in the order they arrive at the church office. If you are not available on the date that has been assigned to you, kindly call Jim or Joan McAnulty at 412-833-8450. If you have not been assigned to be a greeter and wish to do so, call the McAnultys. We are always seeking greeters, as this is a vital ministry at Bower Hill Community Church.



WINTER SNOW PLAN

We are planning some changes this winter season for safety reasons. Bower Hill Church has a lot of areas that must be cleared of ice and snow in order to make them safe for members of the congregation. This is sometimes difficult to do if a storm hits Saturday evening or Sunday morning. The Buildings and Grounds Committee has developed a storm plan. If we experience heavy snow or ice we will close the parking lot next to the Hospice Center. All doors at that end of the building, including the main entrance will be closed. The lower parking lot and the handicapped parking area by the kitchen will be cleared and available. Access to the church will be limited to the handicapped entrance by the kitchen and the entrance under the portico by the church office. Bad weather of this nature is infrequent so we may never have to implement this plan; but if we do, we hope everyone will understand and no one will be inconvenienced.



PRICE INCREASE FOR SANCTUARY FLOWERS

Donati's, the florist that provides our sanctuary flowers for Sunday worship, has added a \$7.50 delivery charge to the \$30 cost for flowers. To keep prices low for everyone we will begin asking all flower donors, both those who donate live flowers and those who make a donation in lieu of flowers, to pay \$35 beginning in January 2009.



If you choose live flowers, the entire \$35 will continue to go directly to the cost of the flowers.



If you choose to make a donation in lieu of flowers, the minimum donation will be \$35. Not only will the first \$5 help defray the new delivery charge for live flowers, but we will also be starting a silk flower maintenance fund for the upkeep of the silk flowers as well as future arrangements. The additional \$30 (or any amount above \$30 you choose to donate) will go to the charity of your choice.

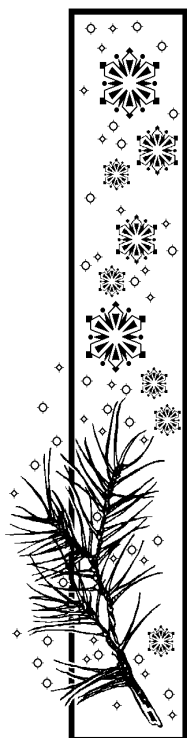

FROM THE PRESBYTERY

The following letter was received from the Pittsburgh Presbytery. Session encourages members to participate. We are looking at making the webinar available for group viewing at Bower Hill. Details of a group viewing will be in the February newsletter.

Our Freedom of Religion at Risk: A Presbyterian Crisis
Your Invitation to a Vital Webinar Convocation on Thursday, February 19, 2009

Is evolving civil law eroding constitutional protection of religious freedom under the First Amendment? Is our historically rooted Presbyterian system of church governance at risk when courts interfere with Presbyteries exercising their ecclesiastical obligations under our *Book of Order*!

You are invited to explore these and related issues at a live and interactive on-line convocation, ***Our Freedom of Religion at Risk: A Presbyterian Crisis***, organized by Pittsburgh Presbytery on Thursday, February 19, 2009 from 2:00-5:30 PM, EST at Beulah United Presbyterian Church, 2500 McCrady Road, Churchill (15235).

Presentation topics followed by on-line group discussions are:

- *The Westminster Assembly* by Dr. Joseph Small
- *Covenant and Freedom of Conscience* by Dr. Beau Weston and Dr. Euan Cameron
- *Religious Liberty: A Legal History* by attorneys Mark Tammen, Esq. and The Rev. Jeff Tindall

Your participation in this convocation is important because the unity and independence of the church are at risk from within and without. Ministers, sessions, trustees and congregations encouraging division within the church encourage subordination of the church to the state when they file civil lawsuits against presbyteries. Court orders sought to prevent presbyteries from dealing with division, disorder, disobedience, dismissal and determination of the true church threaten the beliefs and religious practices of our denomination.

Evolving civil law in many jurisdictions appears intent on treating all denominations without episcopal hierarchies as congregational in their governance. This trend ignores the Biblical and historical nature of Presbyterian ecclesiastical practices. It weakens the constitutional barrier against government interference in religion.

Pittsburgh Presbytery recognizes that for too long, Presbyterians have acquiesced to the appealing concept of "me" centered religion. We have not emphasized that Christ's church is not the building where one worships or the congregation where one belongs. Rather, we are one church, universal, in covenant through Christ. The failure to encourage God-centered religious practice has left a void filled by notions that religious organization is no different from any non-religious, non-profit group fully subject to invasion by the state into its internal affairs.

Pittsburgh Presbytery welcomes your attendance at the convocation in person or by group viewing and discussion at your church or at another viewing location.

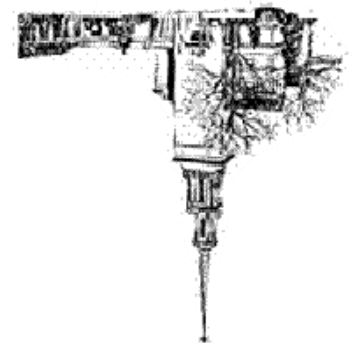
