Dear Friends,

Reassurance abounds in the Prophet's words. There is comfort to be found in Isaiah, particularly the passages known as Second Isaiah, which are found in chapters 40-66. These profoundly significant sections *present a moving vision of the assured hope of God's people in a world whose times are in God's hands.* It is precisely the same hope – of like texture and identical fiber – that abounds here these days at Bower Hill Community Church.

Consider Isaiah 58:11:

*And the Lord will guide you continually,
and satisfy your desire with good things,
and make your bones strong;
and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water,
whose waters fail not.*

Throughout his writings, the Prophet Isaiah carefully chooses his metaphors, and one of his most choice images establishes God's people as God's pleasant plantings in God's pleasant Garden. Envision then, if you will, Bower Hill Community Church as God's Garden of Love: a place where God's love prospers and grows as we *share our bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into our house, when we see the naked, and cover them.* Such imagery rises up in direct contrast to William Blake's oppressive experience, and God's divine edict of compassion flies in the face of rigid religiosity:

*I went to the Garden of Love,
And saw what I never had seen:
A Chapel was built in the midst,
Where I used to play on the green*

*And the gates of this Chapel were shut,
And "Thou shalt not" writ over the door;
So I turn'd to the Garden of Love
That so many sweet flowers bore;*

*And I saw it was filled with graves,
And tomb-stones where flowers should be;
And Priests in black gowns were making their rounds,
And binding with briars my joys and desires.*

Our Pastor Nominating Committee is working with indefatigable assiduity to present to you a pastor who, in my own words, will recognize this congregation as one that serves God in a Garden of Love, a pastor that affirms each individual as one of God's pleasant plantings, a pastor who refuses to bind with briars your joys and desires but, rather, will encourage the Lord to guide you continually, to satisfy your desire with good things, to make your bones strong, so that you shall be like a watered garden, a Garden of Love where the gates of the Chapel are wide open, where God's love grows as our deeds of love and mercy abound.

**BIBLES NEEDED**

While not a "Presbyterian" church, the Protestant community inside the walls of the state prison has an ongoing need for Bibles. They function as a reception center for the Western part of the state which means all parole violators or inmates sentenced to state time from Western PA come through their doors. Due to concerns about contraband, the inmates are not permitted to bring any books, including Bibles. Therefore, a large number of the 60-80 men who enter each week ask for a copy of a Bible and they often run out. They are asking churches in the presbytery to provide old Bibles to be given to men who have a hunger for God's Word. KNOWING THE ROPES: FROM THE W&M COMMITTEE

For about a year, you may have noticed that the last six pews in the back of the sanctuary have been roped off. There was an article about this practice in a previous newsletter, but because of some inquiries, we decided to revisit this issue. We believe that having the congregation seated more towards the front of the sanctuary helps people to hear better and permits the minister to see more of the congregation as he/she preaches. So for the time being, the ropes will remain. We are hopeful that the congregation will begin to grow to such an extent that all the pews will be needed, and the ropes will then be removed.

UPDATE FROM PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Since our last report, the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) has begun to conduct face-to-face interviews with prospective candidates where the questions are more inquiring and thoughtful. Members of the committee have also continued to visit churches to hear and see the preaching style of other candidates. In addition, we have had a meeting

with Cal to reinforce our criteria for choosing the next BHCC pastor. A meeting with the Think Tank is scheduled to be sure the plans and purpose of the groups are in sync. The committee continues to request your prayers and welcomes your questions or comments on the process.

CAMPBELL'S LABELS & THE HOPI MISSION

Bower Hill received a thank you from the Hopi Mission School for our donation of Campbell's labels to their points drive. These accumulated points can result in the Mission School being able to

"purchase" things like vans (a van is 1,600,000 labels and the Mission currently has roughly 808,210). Labels are being collected at Bower Hill in a large brown envelope on the table outside of the office window. The label MUST include both the UPC code and the picture or icon printed next to it (of a Campbell's kid in a mortar board) in order to count for the Mission School's purposes.

FAITH IN ACTION—STARTER KITCHEN SETS



On October 4th we will be celebrating our second "Faith in Action" day at Bower Hill Community Church. One of our projects will be to put together "starter kitchen sets" for the Light of Life Rescue Mission. One of their many important programs is a ministry to previously addicted or abused homeless women. These women and their families are moved into an apartment and given a fresh start on life. Often, however, they lack all of the common household items necessary to take care of their homes and families. This is where we can help!

We will be putting together baskets with the following items:

Pots and pans	Mixing bowls
Measuring spoons and cups	Dishes and drinking glasses
Silverware and serving utensils	Dish soap, sponges, and kitchen towels
New or gently used cook books	Salt and pepper and other common spices

If you would like to help by either purchasing or giving gently used items from the list, we would be most grateful. Also, please help to spread the word to friends and neighbors so that we can make this a community-wide collection. According to Light of Life, the need is great and these kits are given out as quickly as they are collected.

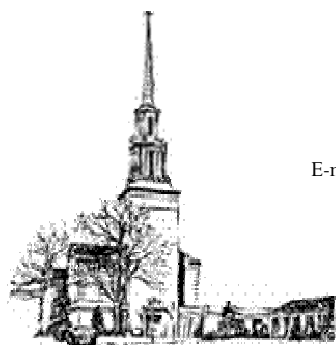
