## OUR LENTEN JOURNEY

*Then Jesus said to his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me."*

**Matthew 16:24**

Dear Friends,

On Ash Wednesday, February 17, we shall commence our forty-day Lenten journey, following Jesus into the wilderness, then to Jerusalem and the cross. It was a lonely journey for the Master, with the intensity of his loneliness captured by the American Spiritual:

*Jesus walked this lonesome valley. He had to walk it by Himself;  
O, nobody else could walk it for him, he had to walk it by himself.*

In this one event—Jesus' lonely journey—lies all the hope of every generation since then until now. By this desolate journey of our Savior, we know that God hears our riveting cries of loneliness and identifies with our personal agony. Even though we are perpetually surrounded by caring people, nobody can actually feel our pain, or suffer our losses, or die our deaths in our place. Yet God in Christ, on his way to the cross, has preceded us in all of these isolated paths. One might even make the case that God had tasted loneliness even before his creating the universe.

*And God stepped out on space  
And He looked around and said,  
"I'm lonely—  
I'll make me a world."*

*With His head in His hands,  
God thought and thought,  
Till He thought: I'll make me a man!<sup>1</sup>*

If there is any truth in James Weldon Johnson's description of the Creation, God himself was lonely, so lonely, it seems, that he decided to create the world and everything in it, including human beings to keep him company. If God was lonely, why would we—created in God's image—be surprised that loneliness is an inescapable element in our human nature! In point of fact, it is precisely this insatiate loneliness that drives us into a mystical union with God. *Our hearts are restless until they find rest in Thee, O God,* cries Augustine.

Soon we'll begin our Lenten journey. It is one we'll take together—collectively as a community of faith—yet at the heart of the excursion, we shall be looking deep within ourselves to the very depths of our individual being, searching for a well-spring of strength to walk this lonesome valley and to ultimately endure the loathsome cross.

In these forty days, may God grant us new meaning for the mystery of life and strength for the mastery of life!

**"I will show thee my faith by my works."**

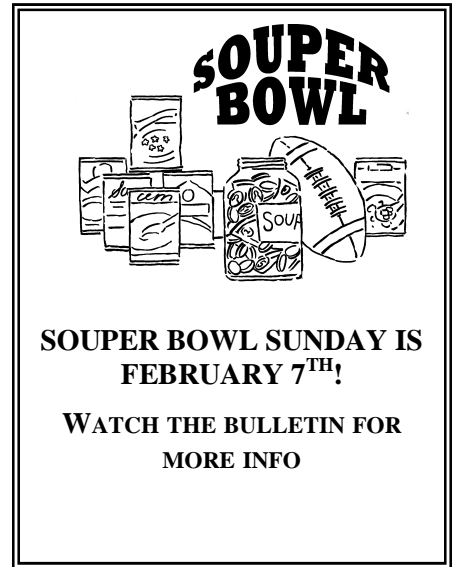

## MUSIC NOTES BY JESSICA BAIER



Lent is fast approaching!! We begin on Ash Wednesday, February 17, with a service of Evensong in the Sanctuary. The service of Evensong is originally part of the Anglican tradition, part of Evening Prayer. It is typically a service of High Mass, including sung psalms, a Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis. The Magnificat translates as the song of Mary, "My soul doth magnify the Lord," and the Nunc Dimittis translates as the canticle of Simeon, "Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace."

This mostly sung service will be offered by the Chancel Choir.

The Chancel Choir will be offering special music in the form of a Cantata for our Good Friday Service, held in the sanctuary. We will be singing a Cantata by Hal H. Hopson, entitled, "Tenebrae: A Service of Darkness." Tenebrae (Latin for "service" or "darkness") is typically held during Passion Week, and is the gradual extinguishing of candles while a series of readings and anthems is presented. Hopson's Cantata commemorates the final hours of Christ's life on earth as He prepared for and suffered death on the cross.

Please consider joining us for all of the special services occurring during Lent.

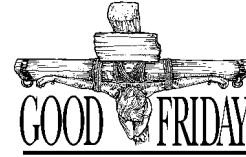

## PNC REPORT



### **From the Pastor Nominating Committee :**

It's a year since the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) began its work to find a new pastor for Bower Hill Community Church. You may remember our process. We spent several months preparing a Church Information Form (CIF) based on the congregational survey completed in late 2008, conversations with church members, consultation with Session and the pastor, and a lot of prayer. This CIF was then advertised on the PCUSA's Church Leadership Connection website, where it was available to pastors across the country who were seeking a new position. These pastors submitted Personal Information Forms (PIFs) describing their qualifications and their experience to the same website. PIFs are matched to our CIF by the computer using key words and phrases and these matches are reviewed further by PCUSA to produce referrals to our PNC. This process has produced more than 170 referrals since last April.

In addition, pastors who review our CIF and find it interesting, may self-refer their PIFs to our PNC with a request to be considered for our position. To date we have received more than 50 self referrals. Our PNC has evolved to focus mainly on the self-referrals.

We have discovered that the characteristics of our church that attract candidates are:

- **Our commitment to mission**
- **Our welcoming of spiritual and lifestyle diversity into our congregation**
- **Our desire to grow spiritually and reach out to our community with God's love.**

What we're looking for is a candidate who:

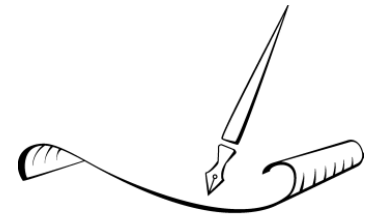
- **Enjoys interacting with people and will love our congregation**
- **Is a strong preacher**
- **Is energetic and enthusiastic about coming to Bower Hill and will help us grow spiritually and in service to Christ.**

Once we have found matches, the committee interviews prospective candidates and their references, listens to sermons on either CD or a website and interviews promising prospects by phone. We eliminate candidates who do not have enough experience, whose qualifications do not match our needs, or who do not show a genuine interest in Bower Hill. We have several candidates that have successfully made it to the stage where our PNC meets with them at Bower Hill to discuss a potential call to our church. Although we have been close, these interviews have not produced the match we are looking for so far.

The holidays and the snow have given us time to contemplate where we are and how to continue. We are not discouraged. In fact right now there are several definite possibilities. Women and men, young and not so young are under consideration. They are all viable candidates, have good preaching skills, support mission projects, meet the theological parameters outlined in our Church Information Form and profess to love the Lord. This is a difficult task and the committee wants to be very careful in making the selection of the next pastor for Bower Hill Church. The committee continues to request your prayers and welcomes your questions or comments on the process.

**HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE SESSION MEETING OF NOVEMBER 23, 2009:**

- The date of the first semi-annual congregation meeting in 2010 will be February 28.
- A new procedure regarding the formation of Session committees was adopted. As a result, the Administration and Personnel Committee will now be formed in the same manner as the other committees of Session. An attempt will be made to broaden the involvement of congregation members in the work of Session committees.
- There are currently five handicapped parking spaces outside the kitchen entrance for use by BHCC members and visitors. Session approved restricting all the other parking spaces in this area to handicapped use on Sunday mornings only.
- A new procedure regarding committee expenditures was adopted. The intent is to avoid budget overruns without prior Session approval.
- The Deacons have adopted an addition to their grief ministry in which a series of four short books are given to members at intervals (three weeks, three months, six months, eleven months) following the death of a loved one.

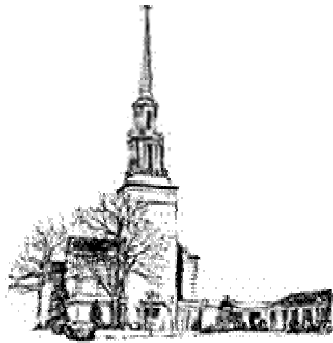
